




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NAVAL AIR STATION FORT WORTH JOINT RESERVE BASE HISTORY

Naval Air Station Fort Worth Joint Reserve Base was first known as Tarrant Field Airdrome until World War I when it became Fort Worth Army Air Field in January 1942, following the attack on Pearl Harbor. The site adjacent to the field was selected in 1941 as a Consolidated Aircraft Factory, later known as "Air Force Plant 4" for the production of B-24 Liberator, B-32 Dominator, B-36 Peacemaker, B-58 Hustler, F-111 Aardvark, F-16 Fighting Falcon, and F-22 Raptor; that site is now operated by Lockheed Martin Aeronautics which is manufacturing the F-35 Lightning II.

In 1948, it was renamed Carswell Air Force Base after Medal of Honor Recipient and Texan Maj. Horace S. Carswell Jr. Throughout the years, the base's overall mission changed as the aircraft factory rolled out new models. After World War II, the base became one of

the few newly formed Strategic Air Command bases. The base also saw its bomb wings transition through a number of bombers, such as the B-36 Peacemaker, B-52 Stratofortress and the B-58 Hustler.

As part of the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990 during Round II Base Closure Commission deliberations, Carswell Air Force Base was recommended for closure. The base ceased operations on September 30, 1993, and was transferred to the Air Force Base Conversion Agency (AFBCA) for property distribution and reuse. On October 1, 1993, the Air Force Reserve 301st Fighter Wing assumed base responsibilities, establishing Carswell as an Air Reserve Base.

The base was later realigned and renamed Naval Air Station Fort Worth Joint Reserve Base (Carswell Field) on October 1, 1994 when the U.S. Navy assumed control of the property. The approximately 2,300-acre

base is the result of the DoD's 1993 BRAC recommendation to relocate NAS Dallas and its tenant commands to the former Carswell AFB. The DoD also relocated other Navy Reserve, Marine Corps, Army, Air Force and Air National Guard commands to the facility. Under the operational command of the Commander, Naval Installations Command, NAS Fort Worth JRB is a joint defense facility which plays a pivotal role in the training and equipping of air crews and aviation ground support personnel.

The installation is located within the city limits of Fort Worth, Texas. Fort Worth is part of the Dallas Fort Worth Metroplex, the largest metropolitan area in Texas. Fort Worth is the fifth-largest city in the state of Texas and the 16th-largest in the United States. The city is also large in geographic area, covering almost 300 square miles. NAS Fort Worth JRB is seven miles north/northwest of downtown Fort Worth.



ARRIVAL

FROM DALLAS/FORT WORTH INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT

Exit the airport from the south exit. Take ramp onto 183 West toward Fort Worth then go 10.7 miles. Continue onto Interstate 820 South for 0.7 miles. Take the left fork onto 121 South toward downtown Fort Worth; go 7.1 miles. Take the Interstate 35 West (south) left exit toward Waco: go 0.7 mile. Take exit 51 onto Interstate 30 West toward Abilene then go 7.6 miles. Take exit 7B TX-341-Spur TX-183 West and go 0.4 mile. Continue on Alta Mere Drive: go 1.7 miles. Bear right immediately after the Quick Trip (QT) gas station and continue on Pumphrey Drive toward the Main Gate.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS FROM INTERSTATE 30 EAST AND WEST

Take exit 7B off Interstate 30 onto Route 183N. Follow 183N for about 2 miles. Follow the NAS JRB sign around the circle to the main gate after passing through the intersection of 183 and Roaring Springs Road. There is a QT gas station on the corner of this intersection.

FROM INTERSTATE 20 EAST AND WEST

Take Exit 431 onto Route 183W. Follow 183 for 7 miles. Follow the NAS JRB sign around the circle to the main gate after passing through the intersection of 183 and Roaring Springs Road. There is a QT gas station on the corner of this intersection.

Visitors without a DoD ID card are required to stop at the Visitor Control Center before entering the installation. The VCC is directly to the right of the Main Gate on Pumphrey Drive.

REPORTING PROCEDURES

All new arrivals to the base should report to their unit of assignment for new arrival check-in instructions. If unsure where to check-in for the gaining command and arriving during normal working hours, report to the Quarterdeck in Building 1510 Chennault Ave., 817-782-7152. After hours, contact the Command Duty Officer at 817-825-4079.

CELL PHONE USE

Cell phone use by the driver of a moving motor vehicle is prohibited on all Department of Defense installations, unless the cell phone is used with a hands-free device.

Service members on Official PCS Orders to NAS Fort Worth JRB receive priority for temporary housing accommodations. Please contact Navy Gateway Inns & Suites to make lodging reservations prior to arrival. The reservations number is 817-782-5483 or DSN 312-739-5483. Military members checking aboard during normal working hours need to report to the gaining Command's Administration Office. If checking aboard after normal working hours, contact the gaining Command's Duty Officer or the NAS Fort Worth JRB Command Duty Officer at 817-825-4079.

Military members who get married before or during a PCS must inform the gaining command to ensure new spouses are sponsored and authorized concurrent travel. The base operates on a Monday through Friday schedule. During drill weekends, Reservists receive priority for billeting onboard NAS Fort Worth. Billeting is usually more available during the week on a Space-A basis. Military members who have received PCS orders and are relocating with their family can make a reservation for temporary lodging at the Navy Gateway Inn & Suites Office by calling 817-782-5483, DSN 312-739-5483, or 1-800-NAVY-INN. NAS Fort Worth JRB also has a Navy Lodge on board. To check on room availability or make a reservation, call 817-569-1700.

Services provided:

Primary Care is available to active duty, line of duty, and Reserve or National Guard members on orders over 30 days.

Dental is available to active duty service members and Reserve or guard members on orders over 30 days.

For Pharmacy service, please refer to https://www.tricare.mil for questions on eligibility.

To obtain specialty care, service members need to see their clinic provider who will submit a referral. After the referral is entered, report to Managed Care to ensure the referral is processed properly with an off-base Tricare Prime network provider.

The Nurse Advice Line is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Nurse Advice Line registered nurses ask a series of questions about a caller's specific health concern and advise the caller on when and how to seek care for an urgent problem or give instruction on self-care at home.

Relay Health is a secure online service through which healthcare providers and patients can securely communicate about healthcare matters. Through Relay Health, service members can consult their doctor about specific health symptoms, request a prescription refill, request appointments, receive lab or test results, and access health education information depending on the types of Relay Health services the provider offers.



FFSC Programs and Services

The FFSC should be one of the first stops upon arrival. It is a key resource on the installation and a gateway to accessing all of the resources available to service members and their families.

The FFSC has three major components:

- Counseling and Family Advocacy,
- Sexual Assault Prevention and Response, and
- Work and Family Life programs.

The overall installation family support system, is a network of agencies, programs, services, partnerships and individuals that support personal and family life readiness, as well as mobilization and deployment readiness.

Counseling and Family Advocacy

A major pillar of FFSC's mandate is providing counseling, consultation and assessments to help with stress, anxiety, deployment and relationship conflicts. The Family Advocacy Program offers awareness and prevention programs, risk assessments, victim advocacy and intervention for incidents of domestic abuse and child abuse/neglect.

Sexual Assault Prevention and Response (SAPR)

The second major pillar of the FFSC is the SAPR program. The SAPR program conducts education and awareness, trains uniformed victim advocates, and offers 24/7 support and assistance. The Safe Help Line is (877) 995-5247.

Work and Family Life (WFL) Program

The final significant pillar of the FFSC is the WFL program. This program offers an array of education and awareness classes for military members and their families to assist in a variety of areas. Some include:

Transition Assistance Program

Leaving the Navy may involve a total lifestyle change. The FFSC hosts the U.S. Department of Labor-sponsored Transition Assistance Program (TAP) Employment Workshop for separating military members planning to leave the service or retire. Known as Transition — Goals, Plans and Success (T-GPS), these information-packed workshops are designed to provide service members with the skills and knowledge necessary to plan and execute a successful transition. The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) presentation on VA benefits is also included.

Personal Financial Management

A program to assist service members in developing a personal and/or family financial management plan. The FFSC's trained personal financial fitness staff can help service members analyze their finances. Military and family members can learn more about setting priorities, creating budgets, debt liquidation, Thrift Savings Plan, consumer and credit

issues, and predatory lending. The FFSC will help service members set a course for financial independence and guide them through their journey of becoming a Wealthy Warrior. The FFSC staff is a centralized training source for command financial specialists.

Employment Assistance

The training, information, and personalized career coaching will help service members identify and reach employment and career development goals, manage the challenges associated with a mobile lifestyle and develop job search skills. Employment assistance professionals can assist with a wide variety of family employment issues.

Life Skills Classes

FFSC offers proactive workshops to enhance and assist with balancing personal and professional lives. This program provides service members with information and education about a variety of life cycle issues, including parenting and relationships to help strengthen personal relationships.

Information and Referral

An integral function of the family center, information and referral services can assist in locating needed services and programs available on the installation, through civilian agencies in the local community, and via national resources.

Ombudsman

The morale, health, welfare and efficiency of command personnel are the responsibility of the Commanding Officer. The Command Ombudsman acts as a liaison between the command and its families. The FFSC's

highly-trained Ombudsmen Coordinator helps Ombudsmen with understanding their duties. The Ombudsman Coordinator provides information to assist Ombudsmen in helping spouses and families meet the unique challenges of a military lifestyle.

The Fleet and Family Support Center may also provide other services such as New Parent Support, Exceptional Family Member information, Individual Deployment Support services, Relocation Program information and assistance and some limited services for military retirees.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Newly assigned personnel should read their facility Emergency Action Plan (EAP) for information on how to respond to the various hazards the installation may experience.

Notifications of a hazard that is occurring or about to occur are published through AtHoc, and may be announced over Giant Voice (outdoor warning system).

Personnel should self-service register their personal devices in AtHoc so that they may receive text messages and e-mail notifications of hazards that may or are affecting the installation. To self-service register devices, click the up arrow on the system task tray, right click on the purple globe with a satellite orbiting — then select "Access Self Service"

The greatest hazard for NAS Fort Worth JRB is destructive weather in the form of severe thunderstorm products (lightning, high winds, flooding, large diameter hail, and tornados). The Dallas Fort Worth metroplex uses a siren system (outdoor warning system) to warn of a tornado. When the siren sounds, go indoors

and tune to local broadcast media — if severe weather is the threat, go to the innermost room or hallway on the lowest floor, stay away from windows.





The wing would also respond during a national crisis.

10th Air Force History

Tenth Air Force was activated in February 1942 at Patterson Field, Ohio. In August 1943, it was assigned to Air Forces China-Burma-India Sector. Throughout the years there were numerous inactivations and activations. In 1976, it was re-designated Tenth Air Force and assigned to Air Force Reserve Command and eventually moved to NAS Fort Worth JRB (then Carswell Air Reserve Station) in June 1996.

10th Air Force Operations

With 45 full-time and 24 traditional reserve headquarters staff members, Tenth Air Force serves as the focal point for all matters pertaining to assigned Air Force Reserve units and individuals. The headquarters monitors and provides assistance to all subordinate units to help resolve problem areas and more efficiently maintain unit combat readiness.

Tenth Air Force is the Air Force Reserve Command's most diverse Numbered Air Force. It manages and supervises all reserve fighter and bomber operations and training, special operations, rescue, airborne warning and control, combat air operations battle staff, remotely-piloted aircraft, space, cyber, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance units. When mobilized or used in a full-time capacity, Tenth Air Force delivers combat capability to Air Combat Command, Air Force Special Operations Command, Pacific Air Forces, Air Force Space Command, Air Force Global Strike Command, Air Education and Training Command, and the Air Force Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance Agency, as well as United States Strategic Command.

Almost all flying organizations within Tenth Air Force are associated with active-duty units. Active associate wings, in which the reserve unit maintains responsibility for the equipment, fly the F-16 Fighting Falcon, A-10 Thunderbolt II and B-52 Stratofortress. Where the active duty maintains responsibility for the equipment, Tenth Air Force members are classically associated in missions flying the F-35 Lightning II, F-22 Raptor, F-15E Strike Eagle, F-16, B-52, B-1B Lancer, U-28, C-145A, C-146, AC-130U Specter, MC-130H Combat Talon, E-3 Sentry, and the Predator, Reaper and Global Hawk Unmanned Aerial Vehicles.





The 920th Rescue Wing is a stand-alone unit equipped with the HC-130 Hercules and the HH-60 Pave Hawk helicopter.

Other organizations include combat air operations, medical, civil engineer, combat logistics, communications, security forces, aerial port, intelligence and aeromedical units. Additionally, the Reserve portion of the Air National Guard/ Air Force Reserve Test Center (AATC), which conducts operational test and evaluation of fighter equipment and improvements, is directly assigned to Tenth Air Force, as is the 610th Command and Control Squadron, which directly supports United States Strategic Command.

The 301st Fighter Wing is one of more than 50 flying units in the U.S. Air Force Reserve. The wing along with its higher headquarters, 10th Air Force, is located at Naval Air Station Fort Worth Joint Reserve Base in Fort Worth, Texas. With more than 2,000 Reserve Citizen Airmen, active duty and civilians, the fighter wing is the largest tenant unit on the installation.

The mission of the 301st Fighter Wing is to train and deploy combat-ready Airmen, and is equipped with the F-16C+ Fighting Falcon aircraft.

The wing has a rich history dating back to the mid-1940s and it continues to make history.

Activated on October 5, 1944, the 301st Fighter Wing flew the P-47 Thunderbolt escorting bombers in East Asia supporting the Ryukyus campaign during World War II. Five years later, it deactivated. In 1972, the fighter wing reactivated at Carswell Air Force Base in Fort Worth, and has been located here ever since.

The wing was the first Air Force Reserve fighter unit to deploy to overseas bases for NATO exercises when it deployed to Norvenich Air Base, Germany, in August 1977, and again, to Cigli Air Base, Turkey, in October 1982.

The 1990s began with wing members being called to active duty during Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. Later, the wing deployed its aircraft to Darwin, Australia, as the



first Air Force Reserve fighter wing to participate in Aces North, a joint U.S.-Australian exercise.

The post-Cold War era has been characterized by an increase in contingency operations. The 301st FW participated in seven operations, flying approximately 1,000 combat sorties over Bosnia and Iraq. These included Operation Deny Flight, Operation Decisive Edge, Operation Southern Watch, and Operation Northern Watch.

Shortly after the 9/11 attacks, Reserve Citizen Airmen deployed in support of Operation Southern Watch. After they arrived, they were also tasked to fly nearly 200 missions and released approximately 200 bombs on enemy targets during Operation Enduring Freedom. On the home front, wing members supported Operation Noble Eagle (ONE) homeland-defense missions.

Since 9/11, 301st Fighter Wing units have deployed supporting Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Noble Eagle, Operation Iraqi Freedom, and Operation Freedom's Sentinel.

The Air Force Reserve's premier fighter wing is composed of command and wing staff agencies, three groups and two direct reporting units. The units are:

301st Operations Group

The 301st Operations Group directs the training and readiness of assigned personnel who assure the following capabilities: immediate

mobilization and worldwide deployment; employment of the F-16C+ utilizing the aircraft's unique precision ground attack and offensive capability; constant vigilance at home and abroad to provide an advanced force for homeland defense.

301st Maintenance Group

The 301st Maintenance Group directs component repair, equipment maintenance, sortie production and overall daily maintenance operations for the wing. The group employs more than 750 military and civilian personnel in 21 Air Force specialty areas. The group provides intermediate and organizational level F-16 maintenance support for the 457th Fighter Squadron with highly trained, deployable personnel. It ensures quality of aircraft maintenance with an annual operating budget of \$2.2M. The 301st Maintenance Group is comprised of two squadrons — Maintenance Squadron and Aircraft Maintenance Squadron.

301st Mission Support Group

The 301st Mission Support Group commands more than 600 military and civilian Airmen in civil engineering, force support, security forces, communications, logistics readiness, aerial port, contracting, deployment processing, and bio-environmental. The group implements and directs programs, plans and policies for assigned F-16s in wartime and contingency missions as well as peacetime quality of life.

It directs management, training and budget reports to maximize readiness within funding constraints while overseeing wing military construction projects.

301st Medical Squadron

The 190-plus member squadron provides in-garrison support to the 301st Fighter Wing and deployable support to combatant commands. The medical unit is one of three Air Force Reserve Command medical units to establish and fully staff an Expeditionary Medical Support facility in a deployed environment.

355th Fighter Squadron

The 355th Fighter Squadron is an active-duty associate direct reporting unit to the fighter wing. The active-duty squadron integrates into the 301st Fighter Wing by providing F-16 Fighting Falcon aircraft maintenance, pilots and other support personnel to execute strategic attack, counter air, air interdiction and close air support missions. It is one of the U.S. Air Force's largest total force enterprise wings.

44th Fighter Group

The 44th Fighter Group is a classic associate unit partnered with the 325th Fighter Wing at Tyndall AFB, Fla. The unit's mission centers around the F-22 Raptor, a 5th generation fighter aircraft, and T-38A Talon Adversary aircraft. The squadrons within the group are the 301st Fighter Squadron and 44th Maintenance Squadron. Its mission is to train and produce unrivaled 5th generation combat airpower through mission-ready Airmen.

Air National Guard Band of the Southwest




The Air National Guard Band of the Southwest is, by gubernatorial decree, the official band of the state of Texas. The band is a component of the Texas Air National Guard and is based with the 136th Airlift Wing at NAS Fort Worth JRB, Texas. Historically known as the 531st Air Force Band, the Air National Guard Band of the Southwest is proud to have served the military personnel and citizens of the United States of America for over fifty years, from local community concerts to ceremonies for elected state and federal government officials, including the President of the United States.

Air National Guard musicians are citizen-airmen: part-time Guard members with full-time civilian careers. They rehearse and perform one weekend a month and perform an annual concert tour. Within the

organization, the Band has a concert band, jazz ensemble, and various pop and concert small ensembles. The Band's current area of responsibility includes Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas, and Texas, although it has performed in more than a dozen states. The Band has

twice deployed units to Southwest Asia, touring Iraq, Afghanistan, Kuwait, Kyrgyzstan, Qatar, and Djibouti in 2007 and 2011. As part of the Texas National Guard, the Band was also activated to support humanitarian relief efforts in the wake of Hurricanes Katrina, Rita, and Harvey.

The 90th ASB mission is to provide logistics and sustainment force health protection to an Expeditionary Combat Aviation Brigade. The Aviation Support Battalion (ASB) serves as the primary source of logistics for the aviation brigade. The ASB plays a dual role in providing direct support to the aviation brigade. First, the ASB supports current operations. It monitors the implementation of the support plan. The ASB actively monitors all support operations with the aviation brigade S4, identifies problems, and implements solutions to ensure support requirements are met. Second, the ASB plans to support future operations. It anticipates requirements and incorporates planning guidance. In addition, the ASB commander is a base cluster commander in the division rear and operates under the division command for this mission. The ASB supports the aviation brigade's mission by implementing the Combined Arms Support Command commander's guidance. Specifically, it supports the aviation brigade by providing or coordinating all classes of supply and maintenance. It replenishes basic loads for all its supported units.

The 90th ASB contains a Headquarters and Support Company, a Distribution Company, an Aviation Support Company, and a Brigade Signal Company. The Headquarters and Support Company provides command and control, staff planning and supervision, and food service support for all organic and units assigned or attached to the ASB. The Distribution Company provides logistics service support to an Aviation Brigade. The Aviation Support Company provides Aviation Field Maintenance (AVIM) and limited backup Aviation Field Maintenance (AVUM) support to the Combat Aviation Brigade. The Signal Company provides 24-hour operational signal systems networking to the supported Combat Aviation Brigade, ECAB, or Division which includes deploying, installing, operating, and maintaining these systems.

The 90th Aviation Support Battalion has a prestigious history dating over 100 years to its inception on August 5, 1917. Originally constituted in the National Army as the 315th Supply Train, an element of the 90th Division, it mobilized on September 5, 1917 at Camp Travis, Texas. After a brief period of training it deployed to France as part of the Allied Expeditionary Forces. The unit performed valiantly, earning Meritorious Unit Commendation streamers for its participation in the Lorraine, St. Mihiel and the Meuse-Argonne campaigns of World War I.

On June 6, 1919 after returning from World War I, the 315th Supply Train of the Army's 90th Division demobilized at Camp Bowie, Texas. On June 21, 1921 the unit reconstituted as the 90th Division Train, Quartermaster Company in the organized Reserves and allotted to the Eighth Corps Area. From 1925 to 1942 the unit experienced many reorganizations and redesignations until ordered into active military service on March 25, 1942, at Camp Barkeley, Texas, as the 90th Quartermaster Company. The unit deployed to Europe during World War II participating in the Normandy, Northern France, the Rhineland, Ardennes-Alsace and Central European Campaigns. As a result, the unit earned the Meritorious Unit Commendation embroidered with both streamers for France and Germany, the Invasion Arrowhead for Normandy, and the French Croix de Guerre with Palm Device for participation around the Moselle and Sarre River campaigns. After returning from Europe the unit deactivated in December 1945 at Camp Shanks, New York. In May 1947 the Army reallocated the unit to the Organized Reserves, and reactivated it in June 1947 at San Antonio, Texas under Fourth Army. In 1963, the Army redesignated the unit as HHC, 90th Supply and Transportation Battalion. On September 16, 2010 the Army redesignated the unit as the 90th Aviation Support Battalion (ASB), 244th Aviation Brigade.

On June 11, 2014 the 90th ASB once again answered its nation's call to duty. The unit deployed in Support of Operation Enduring Freedom-Kuwait/Operation Inherent Resolve to provide world class aviation support services to U.S. and Coalition Forces serving in Joint Operations Area Georgia. This was the unit's first activation mission since WWII; the unit performed meritoriously and received the prestigious AAAA Unit of the year award.

The Soldiers of the 90th ASB continue the proud tradition of sacrifice and honorable service to its nation.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Fort Worth District, headquartered in Downtown Fort Worth was established in 1950 after disastrous floods in the area. The District covers a geographical area of about 410,000 square miles, employs more than 1,000 people and is responsible for 25 lakes, major urban floodways and 17 Army and Air Force installations in Texas, New Mexico and Louisiana. The District operates and maintains reservoirs and lakes for outdoor recreation opportunities for millions of visitors annually, while also furnishing approximately 35 percent of Texas' water supply.


The Fort Worth District manages one of the largest military construction programs in the

Corps and supports customers with design and construction projects at 17 Army and Air Force installations in Texas, New Mexico and Louisiana. Over the years, the District has supervised the construction of facilities to include barracks, family housing, training and aircraft facilities, schools, child care centers, clinics, and hospitals.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Regulatory Program is implemented under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act and Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899 for two-thirds of the State of Texas, including three very large, fast-growing metropolitan areas — Dallas-Fort Worth, San Antonio, and Austin — and some of the fastest growing cities in the nation.

The Fort Worth District provides a variety of services to other federal agencies, to include the Department of Homeland Security, Drug Enforcement Agency, Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the Veterans Administration. Current projects include the design and construction of two Border Patrol Stations and two Customs and Border Protection Checkpoints. Additional projects include real estate acquisition, procurement and administrative services for other agencies. The district also provides extensive planning and environmental services for various agencies throughout the district boundary.



The U.S. Coast Guard is a part of the Department of Homeland Security in peacetime and the Navy in times of war. Coast Guard rank insignia are the same as the Navy except for color and the seaman recruit rank, which has one stripe.

E-1 THROUGH E-3 LEVELS

Service members in pay grades E-1 through E-3 are usually either in some kind of training status or on their initial assignment. The training includes the basic training phase where recruits are immersed in military culture and values and are taught the core skills required by their service component.

Basic training is followed by a specialized or advanced training phase that provides recruits with a specific area of expertise or concentration. In the Army and Marines, this area is called a military occupational specialty; in the Navy it is known as a rate; and in the Air Force it is simply called an Air Force specialty.

MID-LEVEL ENLISTED RANKS

Leadership responsibility significantly increases in the mid-level enlisted ranks. This responsibility is given formal recognition by use of the terms noncommissioned officer and petty officer. An Army sergeant, an Air Force staff sergeant, and a Marine corporal are considered NCO ranks. The Navy NCO equivalent, petty officer, is achieved at the rank of petty officer third class.

E-8 AND E-9 LEVEL

At the E-8 level, the Army, Marines and Air Force have two positions at the same pay grade. Whether one is, for example, a senior master sergeant or a first sergeant in the Air Force depends on the person's job. The same is true for the positions at the E-9 level. Marine Corps master gunnery sergeants and sergeants major receive the same pay but have different responsibilities. All told, E-8s and E-9s have 15 to 30 years on the job, and are commanders' senior advisers for enlisted matters.

A third E-9 element is the senior enlisted person of each service. The Sergeant Major of the Army, the Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps, the Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy and the Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force are the spokespersons of the enlisted force at the highest levels of their services.

Officer ranks in the United States military consist of commissioned officers and warrant officers. The commissioned ranks are the highest in the military. These officers hold presidential commissions and are confirmed at their ranks by the Senate. Army, Air Force and Marine Corps officers are called company grade officers in the pay grades of 0-1 to 0-3, field grade officers in pay grades 0-4 to 0-6 and general officers in pay grades 0-7 and higher. The equivalent officer groupings in the Navy are called junior grade, mid-grade and flag.

Warrant officers hold warrants from their service secretary and are specialists and experts in certain military technologies or capabilities. The lowest ranking warrant

officers serve under a warrant, but they receive commissions from the president upon promotion to chief warrant officer 2. These commissioned warrant officers are direct representatives of the president of the United States. They derive their authority from the same source as commissioned officers but remain specialists, in contrast to commissioned officers, who are generalists. There are no warrant officers in the Air Force.

Naval officers wear distinctively different rank devices depending upon the uniform they're wearing. The three basic uniforms and rank devices used are: khakis, collar insignia pins; whites, stripes on shoulder boards; and blues, stripes sewn on the lower coat sleeves.

IPFU Jacket: Sleeves will be down, not rolled or pushed up. Green or black fleece coat is not authorized to be worn with PFU/IPFU. Commanders may authorize long underwear and other items appropriate to weather conditions and type of activity. If Soldiers wear long underwear, they must conceal them with the sweatpants and/or the running jacket.

IFPU Sweat Pant: Legs will be pulled down and zipped to within one inch of bottom.

PTU/IPTU Shorts (with reflective material) and optional IPTU running shorts (without reflective material): The PTU/IPTU shorts waistband will rest at or within two inches of the natural waistline. The lining in the PTU/IPTU shorts may be removed. Short, mid and full length solid black or dark blue form fitting sportswear (i.e. spandex, lycra or elastic) may be worn and visible under both the PTU/IPTU and optional IPTU running shorts.

<u>Short/Long-Sleeved IPFU Shirt:</u> Short or long-sleeved shirt tucked into shorts or running pants at all times. Do not remove or cut sleeves.

Socks: Socks are mandatory. Socks will be white, calf or ankle length and will not have trademark logos.

Athletic Style Shoes: Athletic-style shoes are mandatory. There are no restrictions on the color of the athletic shoes.

<u>Headgear:</u> Green micro-fleece caps without logos/lettering in appropriate weather conditions deemed by the Commander. Bandanas and other similar headscarves/headgear not authorized unless due to medial waiver condition.

Gloves: Gloves will be black leather, knitted, tricot or suede, or a combination of leather, knitted, tricot and suede and without logos.

Reflective Belts: Reflective belts, armbands, etc. are required during periods of low light conditions when wearing optional running shorts (without reflective material) as part of PFU/IPFU. Reflective belts, armbands, etc. are optional when wearing combos of standard issues PFU/IPFU items that contain reflective material on top and bottom garments.

Scarves and Earmuff: Not authorized

Headphones and earphones (iPods, etc.): are authorized while in the fitness center or on designated running areas unless prohibited by the installation commander.

Grooming: All personal grooming standards apply while participating in physical fitness activities.

<u>Customs and Courtesies:</u> Render proper military customs and courtesies to honor the flag during reveille/retreat (come to full attention and rendering proper salute when outdoors). Saluting due to rank recognition is not required when wearing the PFU/IPFU.

<u>General Considerations:</u> Wear of PFU/IPFU is mandatory during unit physical training and during physical fitness testing on JB MDL. Commanders may authorize IPFU in immediate work area or place of detail as work and weather conditions warrant.

<u>Commanders Guidance:</u> When participating in organized PT, any combination of the PFU/IPFU items (shorts, T-shirt, pants and jacket) will be worn as a set and not mixed with civilian clothes. PFU/IPFU items are authorized for wear with conservative civilian/personal attire during individual/personal PT or while off-duty (e.g. PT shirt with personal shorts/pants, PT jacket with personal shirt/pants/shorts, etc.). No civilian/personal items with offensive wording, graphics or photos are to be worn with the IPFU items at any time. Commanders (or equivalent) will determine which PT events are "organized."

Pregnant Soldiers will wear the PFU or IPFU until the uniform becomes too small or uncomfortable. Pregnant Soldiers are authorized to wear the T-shirt outside the trunks. At no time will commanders require pregnant soldiers to buy larger PFU or IPFU in order to accommodate pregnancy. When the uniform becomes too small or uncomfortable, pregnant Soldiers may wear equivalent civilian workout clothes.

The only insignia authorized for wear on the PFU or IPFU is the physical fitness badge. When the physical fitness badge is worn, it is sewn on the upper left front side of the PFU and IPFU T-shirt and the PFU sweatshirt. On the IPFU running jacket, the insignia is sewn centered $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above the word "Army." See AR 600-8-22 for criteria for wear of the physical fitness badge.

The Army Physical Fitness Uniform

Compostion: The APFU consists of the following components

- a. Jacket, running, black and gold, with gold Army logo.
- b. Pants, running, black, with gold Army logo.
- c. Trunks, running, black, with "Army" in gold.
- d. T-shirt, black, short sleeve, with "Army" in gold.
- e. T-shirt, black, long sleeve, with "Army" in gold.
- f. Footwear.
- g. Socks.

Accessories: The following accessories are normally worn with the APFU.

- a. Gloves.
- b. Fleece cap, black

General Guidelines:

- a. Personnel wear the black micro fleece cap pulled down snugly on the head with the bottom edge covering the ears, but not covering the eyebrows. The bottom edge (all) of the cap may be folded, but not rolled.
- b. Commanders may authorize wear of commercial running shoes with calf-length or ankle-length, plain white or black socks (no logos). If worn, ankle-length socks must cover the entire ankle bone and calf-length socks will end at the middle point between the ankle and and the knee. Shoes must accommodate all five toes in one compartment. Those shoes that feature five separate, individual compartments for the toes detract from a professional military image and are prohibited for wear with the APFU or when conducting physical training in a military formation.
- c. Commanders may authorize wear of utility gloves, reflective belts or vests, long underwear, and other items appropriate to the weather conditions and type of activity. If Soldiers wear long underwear or other similar items, they must conceal them from view with a running jacket and pants, if wearing the APFU.
- d. Soldiers are authorized to wear commercially-purchased black spandex shorts under the APFU shorts. The length of the shorts must end above the bottome of the shorts or higher. The commercial shorts must be plain, with no logos, patterns or obtrusive markings. Soldiers are not required to buy the spandex shorts.
- e. When Soldiers wear the APFU as a complete uniform, they will keep the sleeve down on the jacket, the legs down on the pants, and they will tuck the t-shirt inside the trunks. Soldiers may not roll or push up the sleeves of the APFU jacket or long-sleeved shirt. Soldiers may not cuff the APFU jacket sleeved or long-sleeved shirt. There are no restrictions on the combination of APFU items worn, unless the commander has prescribed a particular combination for formation. APFU clothing bag items and APFU option purchase items may be mixed and worn together at the same time.
- f. The APFU is a clothing bag item, which will replace the IPFU. Each item of the APFU is identified with a national stock number and a Defense Logistics Agency Troop Support contract number printed on the label and sewn into the garment. If the label dows not contain this information, the garment is not an authorized garment. Optional purchase APFU items may be worn in lieu of issued APFU, provided the garment is produced by a Natick certified manufacturer and includes the following certification statement printed onto the garment: "This garment is warranted to meet or exceed the standards of this Purchase Description UQC XXX and was produced under Certificate No. from basic material and controlled components warranted by the manufacturer to have been produced in accordance with the sample under current certificate."
- g. Pregnant Soldiers will wear the APFU until the uniform becomes too small or uncomfortable. Pregnant Soldiers are authorized to wear the t-shirt outside the trunks. At no time will commanders require pregnant Soldiers to purchase a larger APFU to accommodate the pregnancy. When the uniform becomes too small or uncomfortable, pregant Soldiers may wear equivalent civilian workout clothes.

NAVY



Short/Long-Sleeved PTU Shirt: Gold, 100% polyester with anti-microbial and moisture wicking materials and a crewneck collar. It is of loose fit design in unisex sizing. Contains the word "NAVY" in reflective 1½ " capital letters affixed to the upper left front side and upper center back of the shirt in 3" capital letters. Wear right side out, front of shirt to front of body with sleeves rolled down.

PTU Sweatshirt: The Navy Sweat Shirt is navy blue, 50/50 cotton/polyester blend (hooded or crew neck), with reflective Navy lettering outlined in gold on the back and reflective Navy lettering and Navy Seal outline in gold on the front. The Navy Sweat Shirt may be optionally worn with the PTU during command directed group/unit PT and will be worn outside of the sweat pant.

<u>Pant, Sweat, Navy:</u> The sweat pant is navy blue, 50/50 cotton/polyester blend, with reflective lettering vertically outlined in gold outboard on each pant leg. The Navy Sweat Pant may be optionally worn with the PTU during command directed group/unit PT and will be worn squarely on the waist with both pant legs fully extended.

<u>PTU Shorts:</u> Navy blue, with 100% nylon shell and 100% polyester (with moisture wicking and odorresistant) liner. Elastic and drawstring waistband with two side pockets (one on each side) and one hidden elastic ID card pocket attached to the waistband of the inside liner. The shorts also contain the word "NAVY" in reflective $1\frac{1}{2}$ " capital letters affixed to the front left leg. Shorts come in various unisex sizes with either a 6" or 8" leg length. Shorts will be worn fully on the waist.

<u>Socks:</u> Made of undecorated, plain or ribbed, cotton, polyester, or lycra, or any combination of those knitted materials. Socks shall not extend above mid-calf. Low cut socks are authorized. Solid white or black in color. Wear right side out.

<u>Shoes:</u> Low or high-cut commercial brand athletic shoe designed to support planned exercise. Shoes should be comfortable and support the planned exercise; color is optional and all fasteners closed.

Minimalist footwear: Minimalist footwear is defined as shoes that allow the foot to function naturally without providing additional support or cushioning. Any shoe that is marketed as minimalist or barefoot-like footwear (current types such as the - Vibram five fingers, Nike free shoes, Vivo barefoot shoes, Inov-8 shoe, and FeelMax) are authorized for wear with the PTU.

<u>Headphones/earphones</u>: (iPods, etc.) are authorized while in fitness centers or on designated running areas only

<u>Grooming:</u> All personal grooming standards apply while participating in physical fitness activities with one exception: long female hair will be secured but may have loose ends and may extend below the collar; i.e., ponytails.

<u>Customs and Courtesies:</u> Render proper military customs and courtesies to honor the flag during reveille/retreat (come to full attention). Saluting due to rank recognition is not required when wearing the PTII

<u>General Considerations</u>: The PTU is designed primarily for group/unit physical training activities and the semi-annual Physical Fitness Assessment (PFA); however, it can be worn both on and off base for fitness and/or leisure unless determined otherwise by regional coordinators or Commanding Officers.

- a. In-port and when performing command directed "group/unit" physical training activities, semi-annual PFA (to include Body Composition Assessment (BCA) and Physical Readiness Test (PRT)), the PTU shirt will be tucked into the shorts. Shorts will be worn fully on the waist. The length of the shorts will not extend below the top of the knee. Running shoes will be comfortable and support the planned exercise. Athletic socks must be worn and shall not extend above mid-calf. Low cut socks are permitted. Pregnant Sailors will wear the shirt out and will discontinue wearing the PTU when it becomes too tight. Female Sailors will wear a sport or dress brassiere when wearing the PTU. Additional undergarments are authorized for all hands.
- b. At sea, the wearing of the PTU will be at the discretion of the Commanding Officer. Requirements for female Sailors remain as stated whether wearing the PTU or other personal fitness attire.
- c. During individual PT, shirts may be worn in or out of shorts. All other requirements are the same as "in-port."
- d. While on liberty, components of the PTU are authorized to wear Individually or collectively. The PTU will not be worn while in a duty status or when conducting official business on base (e.g., PSD's, Medical treatment facilities, galleys, legal).
 - e. The PTU is not authorized to be worn in lieu of the working, service, or dress uniform while in a limited or light duty status.
- f. Optional components are provided for additional comfort and support. Long sleeved PTU shirts and/or navy knit watch caps are authorized when weather conditions warrant. Compression shorts/modesty liners are authorized but must not be visible while standing and will be either black or navy blue in color.
 - g. In all cases, the PTU will be worn in such a manner so as to reflect credit upon the Navy and the individual wearing the PTU.

AIR FORCE



PTU/IPTU Jacket: Jacket zipped at least halfway between the waistband and collar. Sleeves end within 1 inch of wrist. Green or black fleece coat is not authorized to be worn with PTU/IPTU. Do not mix/match PTU/IPTU running suit jacket and running suit pants. All other combinations authorized.

Short/Long-Sleeved PTU/IPTU Shirt: Short or long-sleeved shirt tucked into shorts or running pants at all times. Do not remove or cut sleeves. Short or long-sleeved white or light gray form fitting undershirts, (i.e. spandex, lycra or elastic material) may be worn and visible under short or long-sleeved PTU/IPTU shirt. Undershirt must be tucked in.

IFPU Sweatshirt: Sweatshirt extends no lower than six inches below natural waist line. Do not push up, remove or cut sleeves.

PTU/IPTU Running Pant: Waistband rests at or within two inches of natural waistline. Both pant legs extend below ankles and zipped to within once inch of bottom.

PTU/IPTU Shorts (with/without reflective material): PTU/IPTU shorts waistband rests at or within two inches of natural waistline. Lining in PTU/IPTU shorts may be removed. Short, mid and full length solid black or dark blue form fitting sportswear (i.e. spandex, lycra or elastic) may be worn visibly under both the PTU/IPTU and optional IPTU running shorts.

Reflective Belts: Reflective belts, armbands, etc. are required during periods of low light conditions when wearing optional running shorts (without reflective material) as part of PTU/IPTU. Reflective belts, armbands, etc. are optional when wearing combos of standard issue PTU/IPTU items that contain reflective material on top and bottom garments.

Socks: Socks are mandatory. Socks will be white and may have small trademark logos.

Athletic Style Shoes: Athletic style shoes are mandatory. There are no restrictions on the color or the athletic shoes.

Headgear: Knit watch caps will be plain black, dark blue or sage green without logos/lettering. Solid black or dark blue baseball/sport caps (w/optional AF logos/lettering) are authorized during individual PT and shall be worn outdoors only. Bandanas and other similar headscarves/headgear not authorized unless due to medical waiver condition.

Gloves: Gloves will be black or dark blue leather, knitted, tricot or suede, or a combination of leather, knitted, tricot, and suede and without logos.

<u>Scarves and Earmuff:</u> Scarved will be black or dark blue, all wool or cotton simplex, with or without napped surface, and less than 10 inches in width. Earmuffs will be solid, black or dark blue, made of any material and may wrap around either top/rear of head.

<u>Headphones and earphones:</u> (iPods, etc.) are authorized while in the fitness center or on designated running areas unless prohibited by the installation commander.

Grooming: All personal grooming standards apply while participating in physical fitness activities with one exception: long female hair will be secured but may have loose ends and may extend below the collar; i.e., ponytails.

<u>Customs and Courtesies:</u> Render proper military customs and courtesies to honor the flag during reveille/retreat (come to full attention and rendering proper salute when outdoors). Saluting due to rank recognition is not required when wearing the PTU/IPTU.

General Considerations: Wear of PTU is mandatory during unit physical training and during physical fitness testing on JB-MDL. Commanders may authorize PTU in immediate work area or place of detail as work and weather conditions warrant.

When participating in organized PT, any combination of the PTU/IPTU items (shorts, T-shirt, pants and jacket) will be worn as a set and not mixed with civilian clothes. PTU/IPTU items are authorized for wear with conservative civilian/personal attire during individual/personal PT or while off-duty (e.g. PT shirt with personal shorts/pants, PT jacket with personal shirt/pants/shorts, etc.). No civilian/personal items with offensive wording, graphics or photos are to be worn with the PTU/IPTU items at any time.

*Note: Commanders (or equivalent) determine which PT events are "organized."

MARINES



The following physical training uniform guidance is taken from MCO P1020.34G.

- The standard physical training (PT) uniform consists of the green general purpose trunks and the standard olive green undershirt. Footwear or headgear with PT uniforms will be as prescribed by the commander.
- The cold weather PT uniform consists of an olive green sweat shirt and olive green sweat pants, with "USMC" lettering and Marine Corps emblem on the left breast of the shirt and upper left leg of the pants. This uniform may be prescribed for unit physical training when the weather requires.
- 3. The Marine Corps running suit is comprised of a green jacket and trousers with reflective piping material and inserts, a silver Marine Corps emblem on the left breast of the jacket and upper left thigh of the trousers. There is a scarlet and gold "USMC" on the front of the lower right trouser leg and a scarlet and gold "MARINES" on the upper back portion of the jacket. The uniform is meant to be worn in combination with the existing physical training (PT) uniforms, except as indicated below.
- 4. The standard, Marine Corps running suit or cold weather PT uniform will be prescribed for all command PT activities except on those specific occasions when the commander determines that the wear of shirts with unit distinct markings, or when the modified wear of another uniform or other clothing is more appropriate to the respective unit's physical training objective.
 - Except for the conduct of physical training, PT gear is not authorized for wear during leave and liberty (to include green undershirt and shorts), with the below two exceptions.
 - (1) The sweatshirt may be worn during leave and liberty as an outer garment or as a layering garment (e.g. under a jacket).
 - (2) The running suit jacket may be worn during leave and liberty as an outer garment. When worn on leave and liberty, the jacket must be zipped at least halfway to the top of the zipper.
 - b. The running suit can be worn in any combination with the green general purpose trunks and green undershirt, but is not authorized for wear in any combination with the sweat suit.



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
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
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NAS FORT WORTH JRB MAP
